A sufficient and fair presentation and "clean" audit of the 2021 financial report relating to statements of activities and cash flows for the year end is completed and will be submitted at our March 2022 Second Quarter Meeting.

Socially and Politically Involvement -

The people of the United States are in a season of change that is raising many questions about the character of their country. Beyond interrogating controversial and confrontational actions of its current administration is a deeper question. What kind of people do we intend to be? Women in Ministry and Christians of the United States and the world should resist, peaceably yet forcefully and resolutely, all efforts of exploitation, victimization and manipulation in favor of collaboration for justice and peace. This is the kind of people that you should intend to be.

This year NCAWM will become actively involved in the support of Human Trafficking Awareness. January is Human Trafficking Awareness Month. The Trafficking Victims Protection Act of 2000 defines human trafficking as: Sex trafficking in which a commercial act or obtaining of a person for labor or services using force fraud, or coercion for the purpose of subjection to involuntary servitude. Human trafficking is a global humanitarian crisis that is known as trafficking in persons or modern-day slavery. It is a global form of slavery that occurs in our backyards and often goes undetected. Vulnerable communities are: Women, Youth, Immigrants, Homeless individuals, Children in foster care, Persons with history of trauma and abuse.

If we are engaged in ministries of evangelism, compassion, empowerment and advocacy then we must be challenged toward a deeper and more critical reflection on the faith, love and witness of Jesus Christ. God help us all! If not now, when?

Projected Priorities Accomplished in 2021:

- 1. On behalf of the Elouise Fuller Scholarship Foundation, NCAWM provided a \$500.00 award to **2021 scholarship recipient: Christian Mills from Middlesex, NC.**,.
- 2. On behalf of the Ernestine Batts Mission Foundation, NCAWM provided a \$250.00 award to Lott Carey Disaster Relief Fund and \$500.00 to Kenya Foreign Mission.
- 3. NCAWM Instituted and appointed Ms. Sharnee Pierre as Website Manager.
- 4. Due to Covid-19 and Social Distancing, NCAWM sponsored a successful Joint Annual Ecumenical Interfaith Prayer Summit & 37th Annual Convention Conference on Saturday, November 14, 2021.
- 5. NCAWM received resignation of 2 New County Chapters in 2021: Alamance County and Wilson County
- 6. North Carolina Association for Women in Ministry in partnership with Eastern Carolina Christian College & Seminary established the first Women in Ministry Leadership Certificate Program. Classes started in February 2021 with graduation in May 2021.
- 7. Virtual Friday Morning First weekly intercessory prayer service directed by State Chaplain, Minister Charlene Mangum and County Chapter Presidents continued into 2022. The ability to share prayer requests, praise, and also pray for others helped the feelings of fear and isolation during this pandemic season.
- 8. A successful publication of the 2021 Spring, Fall & Winter Newsletters were released.
- 9. Historically, our Executive Vice President Elder Yvonne Addison was officially appointed in Fall 2021.
- 10. Reverend Barbara Sutton and Lenoir County Chapter accepted guardianship of Foreign Mission Services on behalf of NCAWM to Pastor Albert Washle and the Life Restoration Church of Kenya, South Africa.

 - a. Extend Partnership with East Carolina Christian College and Seminary

- b. Engage younger women in ministry for greater involvement and leadership
- c. Design online classes for remote regions
- d. Develop Emerging leaders
- e. Promote Monthly Book Club Reading
- 4. Provide Heighten NCAWM Awareness
 - a. Increase quality and quantity of marketing
 - b. Engage social media effectively for general awareness, engagement and support
 - c. Grow network
- 5. Expand depth and breadth of NCAWM participation and involvement for First Lady(s) in ministry
- 6. Widen 30+ women in ministry involvements (millennials and Generation X)
- 7. Fortify organizational strength September is a crucial month for our ministry as we mark the end of our fiscal year. This September we're enlarging a network of organizational and individual donors and expand administrative capacity to manage resources and alliances. We are increasing giving amounts from existing donors with a goal of \$50,000 so we can create even more innovative programming and resources for women in ministry.
